The Great Commission as found in Matthew 28:17, commands us: "Go and make disciples of all nations...." These days you may have heard the term "Missional Church". Alan Hirsch in an article in Christianity Today describes missional churches as being grounded in the

understanding of God who by his very nature is a 'sent one' who takes the initiative to redeem his creation. This doctrine, known as *missio Dei*—the sending of God—is causing many to redefine their understanding of the church. Because we are the "sent" people of God, the church is the instrument of God's mission in the world. Hirsch goes on to say that we get it backwards when we talk about the 'church having a mission'. It would be more proper to say 'this mission has a church.'

A missional community sees the mission as both its originating impulse and its organizing principle. A missional community is patterned after what God has done in Jesus Christ. In the incarnation God sent his Son. Similarly, to be missional means to be sent into the world; we do not expect people to come to us. This posture differentiates a missional church from an attractional church.

The most common way of church operating has been as attractional churches. The hope and aim was to attract people who would join in and become like us. A missional way of thinking is focused on how we are sent out into the world.

Which brings me to FWPC: Are you as confused as I am? I have heard "we are not a strong mission church". That is how you described yourself in the Mission Study. Looking at your budget, someone said to me recently, "Wow, the folks at FWPC are really committed to mission."

On one hand, you don't talk much about mission. Right now other than the Amazing Grace ministry and Bible school, you don't have any organized mission programs. However you do give generously to ministry and mission work of others.

On the other hand, from talking with many of you, I know you are doing things like reading to kids in school, volunteering at Meals on Wheels, walking with or sitting with folks at hospice as they make the final transition in life, being a life coach for homeless people, gathering money for coats for needing children, sponsoring 4-H clubs, rescuing dolls that you fix up for children who would have little else at Christmas......What have I missed?

So it got me thinking about the source of the disconnect...the differences in the perceptions. Perhaps you think like so many in traditional ways about mission and evangelism. Mission was usually equated with 'foreign' mission and evangelism meant going out knocking on doors with tract or literature in hand and explaining to people how to become Christian. Too often in the mainline churches, mission is what we might do on a summer trip, or it is what we leave to the 'professional' ministers and missionaries. The rest of us will satisfy ourselves with supporting their work.

A missional theology is not content with mission being a church-based work. Rather, it applies to the whole life of every believer. Every disciple is to be an agent of the kingdom of God, and every disciple is to carry the mission of God into every sphere of life. We are all missionaries sent into a non-Christian culture.

So I would challenge you to think of yourselves here at FWPC as missionaries in all you do. When you are delivering meals to shut-ins, visiting the sick or lonely, sitting with the dying, reading to kids, helping the homeless, mentoring kids in 4-H, delivering food and clothing to the poor...you are doing mission. In all you do, do it to the glory of God and be God's body carrying on the work as He commissioned us and sent us into the world to do.

<u>Youth Group</u> - for funding of Sardine activities, monies coming from collections, work parties and fund raising.

<u>Petty Cash</u> - for minor office type expenses, managed by church secretary.

This is a presentation of Concerts in the Community, a nonprofit series designed to provide a variety of music at a reasonable cost.

Tickets, available in advance or at the door, will be required for admission: main floor - adults \$5; students K-12, \$3; age 4 and younger free; balcony – adults \$3; students, K-12, \$1; and age 4 and younger free. The church is handicap-accessible.

Falling Waters Presbyterian Church Pavilion

Our pavilion has been enjoyed by many of us already, and it is available to be used and enjoyed by our church family. The pavilion is a facility of the church and will be governed by many of the same policies as does Fellowship Hall and Sanctuary.

The pavilion is available to be used by, our church family. This is described as any member of, or anyone who attends Falling Waters Presbyterian Church on a regular basis.

Anyone who falls within the church family as described above, may request the use of the pavilion for a group or family that they are a member of. The stipulation is, that the church family individual must be in attendance for the entire time the pavilion is being used, and that individual accepts full responsibility for the facility while in their use.

A request must be made to use the pavilion and approval given, before using it. This request can be made by contacting the church office at 304-754-8211, or by contacting Sam Tobin at 304-754-7147.

The request must specify if you are asking for use of just the pavilion area (eating area) or the entire facility which includes the kitchen. For all approved usages, the restrooms will be opened.

The facility, restrooms and kitchen, will be unlocked for you on the day of usage.

The picnic tables are not to be loaned out or removed from the pavilion.

The area is to be left in a clean condition and all trash removed.

No tobacco or alcoholic beverages are permitted.

The pavilion is not to be used for "for profit" activities.

The pavilion facility will be open in April and the Maintenance Committee will close it and winterize it the beginning of October. This is based on calendar dates. If weather permits and there is a request for usage, a later close date will be considered.
