What Do You Expect From a Pastor?

As your Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) is getting ever closer to nominating a new pastor....yes even though they are beginning a second round of looking at resumes....this article came across from a colleague whom I follow in her writings. While she talks some about taking care of pastors who have been 'on the job' for a while and may be needing some renewal, the article raised some interesting questions about how we 'use' pastors. What do you expect of a pastor? How do see them being a tool in carrying out the Mission and Ministry of Falling Waters Presbyterian Church.

So I commend to you this article from Rev. Jan Edminston who currently serves as Executive Presbyter in Chicago:

Is Your Pastor a Tool?

I ask this in the most positive way possible. The reason our churches have buildings, classrooms, Bibles, coffee makers, printing machines, hymnals, screens, parking lots, playgrounds, flip charts, and all other property is because they are all tools for ministry. We do not worship them. We use them to carry out our ministry, to make disciples and to love God and neighbor.

And not only does a pastor have tools for ministry from libraries to computers to a seminary degree, but we pastors **are** tools for ministry. We want to be sharp and effective.

Think of all the different professions that need tools: cooks, potters, electricians, gardeners, seamstresses, construction workers, teachers, and students. We pastors metaphorically do the work of ordinary tools.



Imagine:

The pastor as aerator bringing fresh air to dry, unhealthy landscapes.

The pastor as flashlight bringing light to dark spaces.

The pastor as spatula stirring things up as needed.

The pastor as hammer offering leverage when a wall

needs to be torn down.

The pastor as needle patching up what is torn. The pastor as broom cleaning up the debris.

You get the idea.

As I work with so many good pastoral leaders, it's clear that after many years on the job, we get tired and dull. Some of us haven't taken a life-changing continuing education class or retreat (i.e. something to help us "get sharper") in years. Some have never had a sabbatical. I hate to admit this, but some of us haven't read a new book in a while.

Now more than ever, our spiritual communities need the right tools to do ministry and that includes a strong, well-trained, energetic equipper of the saints — an effective pastor. If you know a pastor who no longer has the capacity to be effective, there are things we can do to encourage her/him. Support them in prayer, financial care, and offerings of coaching, counseling, and recovery time. God deserves our very best.

Four Cents A Meal Sunday

On the first Sunday of each month we collect our **Four Cents A Meal Offering**. This hunger offering is collected on the first Sunday of each month. 25% of the offering benefits Hedgesville Loaves and Fishes and the other 75% is sent to the PCUSA for world-wide hunger programs. It is called Four Cents A Meal because it is suggested that each family contribute four cents for each meal each family member eats in one month, i.e. a family of four would contribute 16 cents per meal per day. 16 cents x 3 meals a day = 48 cents. 48 cents x 30 days = \$14.40 per month.

Stewardship and Dougie Harlan

Dougie Harlan graduated from Shepherd College in 1931. She was a longtime teacher/educator in the Berkeley County School System. Education was a very important part of her life, and she continually devoted her time, talent, and financial resources to our church throughout her life. Educating children was her passion.

Late in her life, she decided that she wanted to help the children of our church financially in a larger way by establishing the M. Douglass Harlan / FWPC Higher Education Fund. The purpose of this fund was to encourage our young people to pursue higher education after graduation from high school.

The monies in this fund have been used many times by young people of our congregation. Because the monies in this fund continue to be used by our young people to supplement their own financial resources, and because these funds are limited to what was originally donated by Dougie, growth of this fund has been limited.

Realizing the higher cost of education today, The Trustees, along with The Session, have discussed the possibility of increasing the amount that may be available to young people applying for these funds. We are serious about the future and education of our youth and the increased costs of higher education.

Certainly, Dougie Harlan's legacy should be continued by the members of our Church. She loved our church and she loved our young people.

One way to help Dougie's legacy grow is to invite interested members to contribute to her education fund, ensuring that this fund is never depleted and will always be a resource for the young people of our Church. Checks may be made payable to FWPC with Dougie Harlan in the memo line
