Always Being Reformed...or Why We are Not the Frozen Chosen!



We are of the Reformed Tradition. Our motto is "Ecclesia reformata semper reformanda". This phrase appeared first in 1674. It is translated in several ways: "The church is always to be reformed"; "The church is reformed and always being reformed"; "The reformed church is always to be reformed."

Alister McGrath, in his history of Protestantism called "Christianity's

Dangerous Idea", writes that "Protestantism stated its identity in terms of a method rather than an outcome.....The Protestant principle of grounding matters of doctrine and ethics in the Bible and subjecting these to constant review immediately generated controversy."

Given the changing world around us, McGrath looks at the ways we might respond. One says we must preserve or 'freeze' moments from the past; that the way our forbearers did it was so wonderful and great, we must preserve it at all costs. The other is to claim the original principle of being willing to constantly examine ourselves (as individuals and a church) in light of the Bible and to change and correct according to our new understandings.

Jill Duffield, editor of the *Presbyterian Outlook*, reminds us in the October 26th issue, that the natural tendency of institutions and movements, is to start with the creative energy of a new thing, with leaders having a vision that people grab hold of and follow. The next stage is to consolidate those changes and 'new things'. By the third generation, the focus often becomes preserving the original movement. The focus goes to what our elders did rather than focus on the values they were living out in creating what they created.

One of the laments, I hear over and over in the church today is "People just won't come to Sunday School any more. Used to be we would have more people in Sunday School than in worship." What is forgotten is that the Sunday School movement was a creative and energetic response to the need to educate people in the Scriptures. If that model no longer works,

what other ways are we teaching the Scripture and training disciples?

We can spend our time and energy lamenting what has been lost; that there are so many competing options on Sunday morning; that people aren't as loyal to a denomination or even congregation as they once were. Or we can look around us and consider how we make disciples in today's world.

Are we willing to reexamine ourselves in light of Scripture and new understandings and challenges to us? Are we willing to be reformed anew? Jesus said: "I have come to do a new thing." and "I have come that you may be reborn."

Another story in the October 26th issue of *The Outlook* is of Johnson C. Smith Seminary, one of our 10 Presbyterian Seminaries and the only historically black one. In 2010, they had only 17 students. Instead of closing their doors which many thought they should, they rethought their mission by listening to students and pastors who were looking for continuing education and those who felt called to ministry but were not sure they could afford the cost. They have reformed and are starting some exciting new missions and programs to respond to the needs that were expressed.

The Reformers of Luther and Calvin's era were keenly aware of the need to get the Bible into the hands of the people and to teach them they could go directly to God in prayer. They wanted people to have a faith that changed them and the way they lived.

There is great need around us and while many claim to be 'none' when it comes to church affiliation, there is also great spiritual hunger. Do we maintain ways of doing things because they were a good idea 50, 20 5 or even 1 year ago and hope that people will find us. Or will let ourselves be reformed by the Holy Spirit and open to the new thing that God might be doing through us and find ways to go out to all of God's children who might not even know their need for Him?

For the past five years members of FWPC have made a donation at Christmas to the Warm the Children fund through the Martinsburg Journal. This program Local Missions has donated about \$431,000 in warm clothing to thousands of children in

Berkeley, Jefferson and Morgan Counties. Last year the number of children served was nearly 500. There are no administrative costs and 100% of the money is used directly for the children. The program relies solely on volunteers - those who coordinate the program and also those who donate their time to shop with the parents. What is the "Four Cents A Meal Offering"?

This hunger offering is collected on the first Sunday of each month. 25% of the offering benefits Hedgesville Loaves and Fishes and the other 75% is sent to the PCUSA for world-wide hunger programs. It is called Four Cents A Meal because it is suggested that each family contribute four cents for each meal each family member eats in one month, i.e. a family of four would contribute 16 cents per meal per day. 16 cents x 3 meals a day = 48 cents. 48 cents x 30 days = \$14.40 per month.

- **4.** Discusses money openly in the context of worship, instead of considering money a disreputable subject.
- **5.** Engages in mission beyond its own doors and see's mission both locally and world-wide through a planned year-round program.
- **6.** Has a long range campaign plan in place for its objectives and its financial needs.
